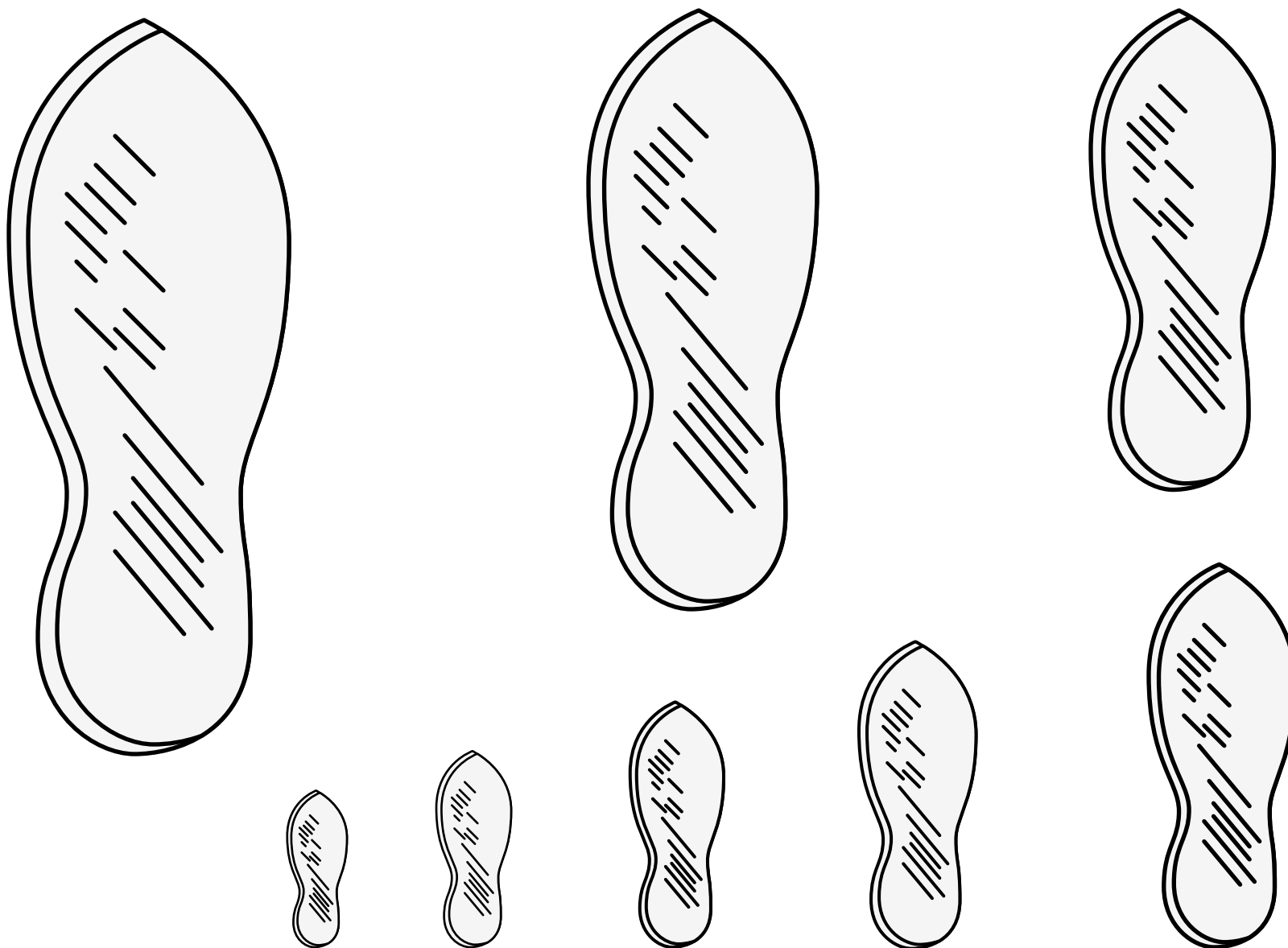

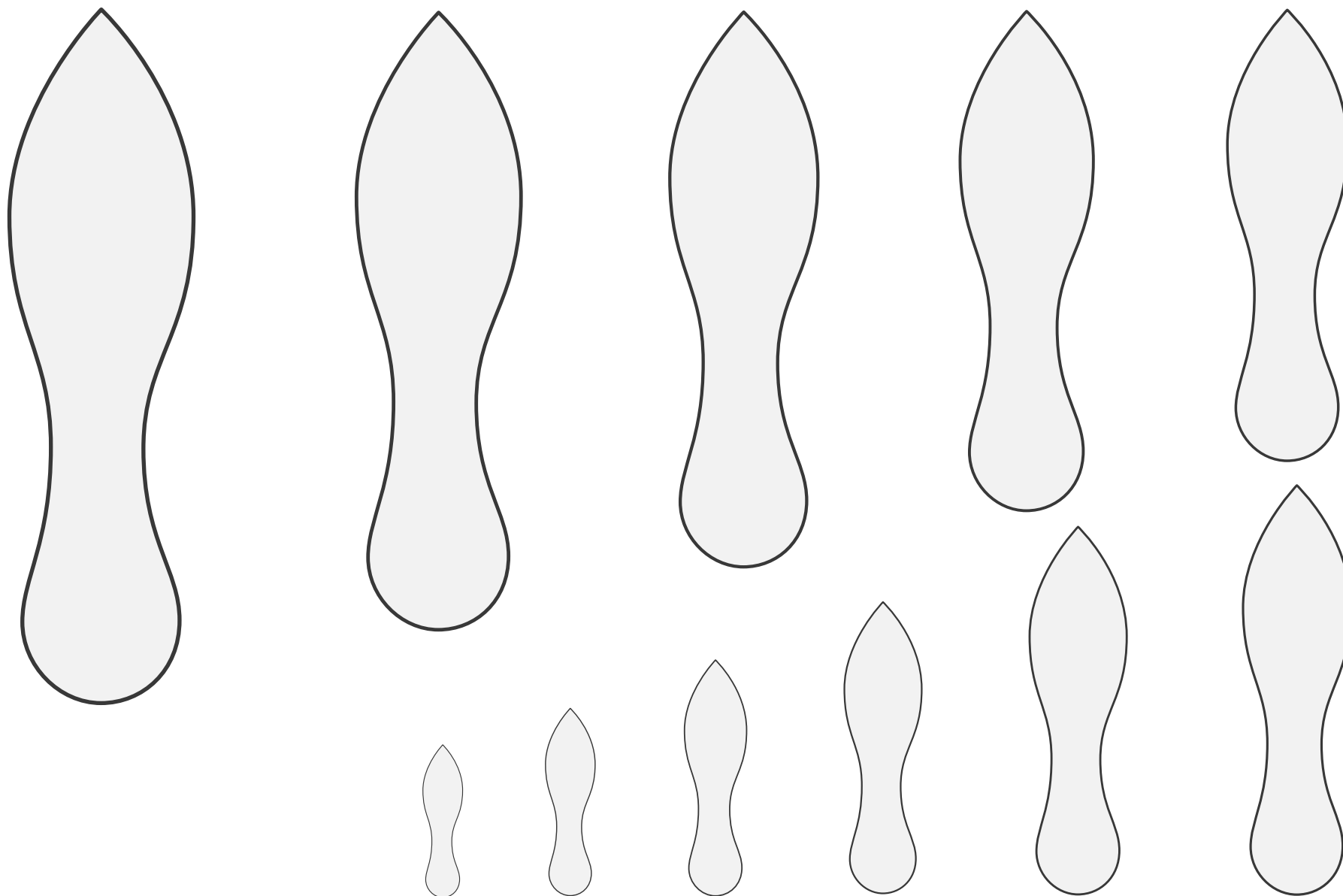


The bottom of a shoe.

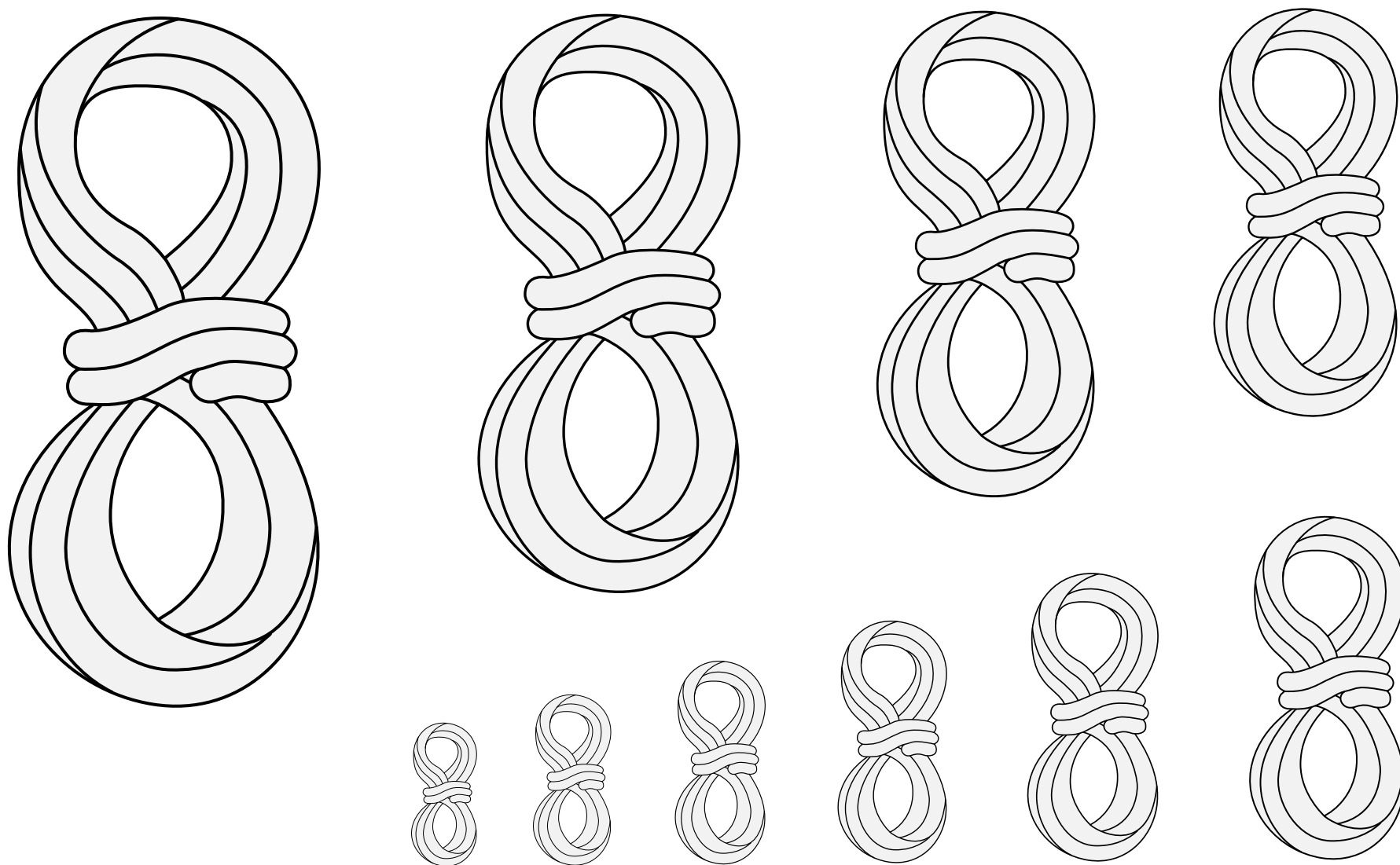

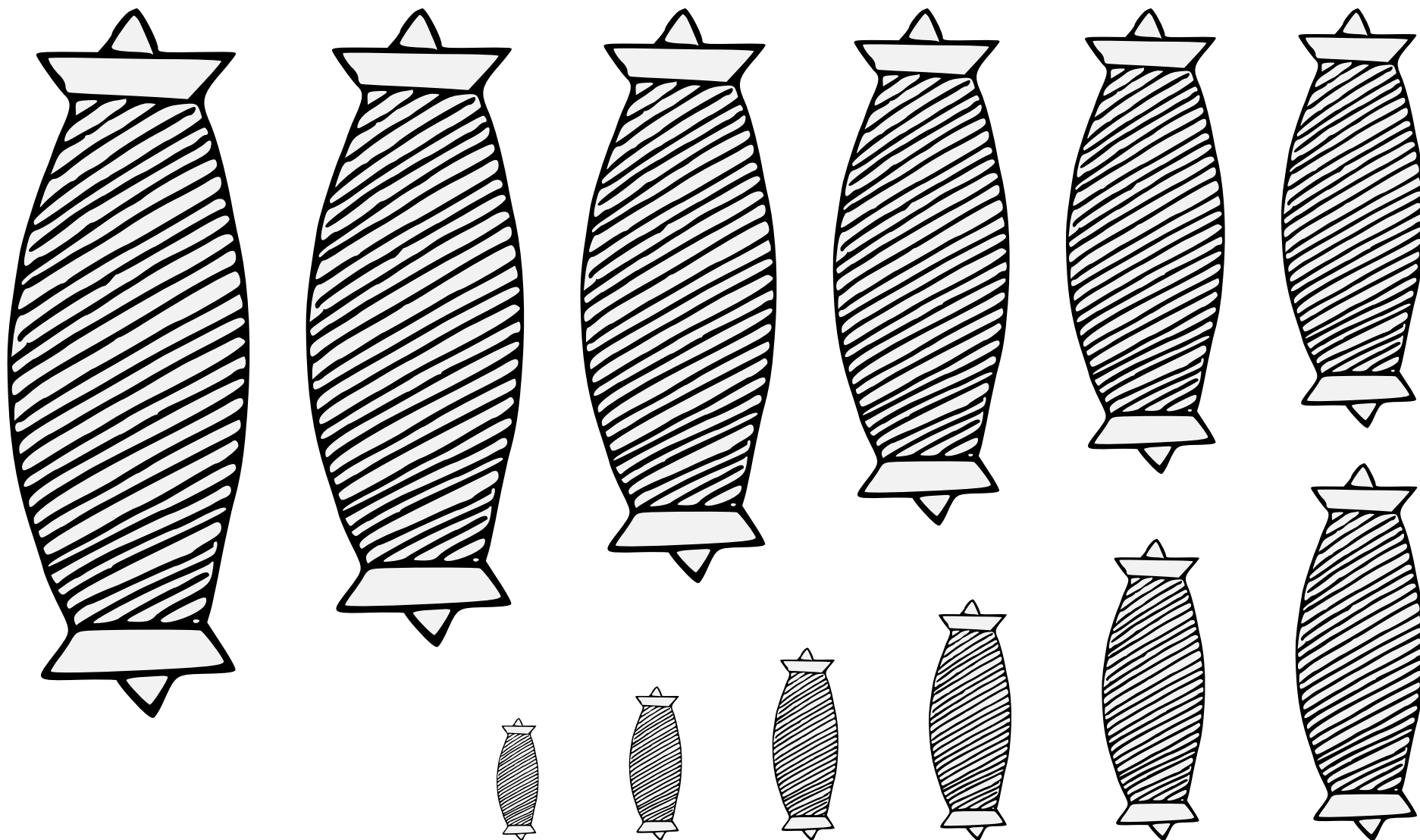

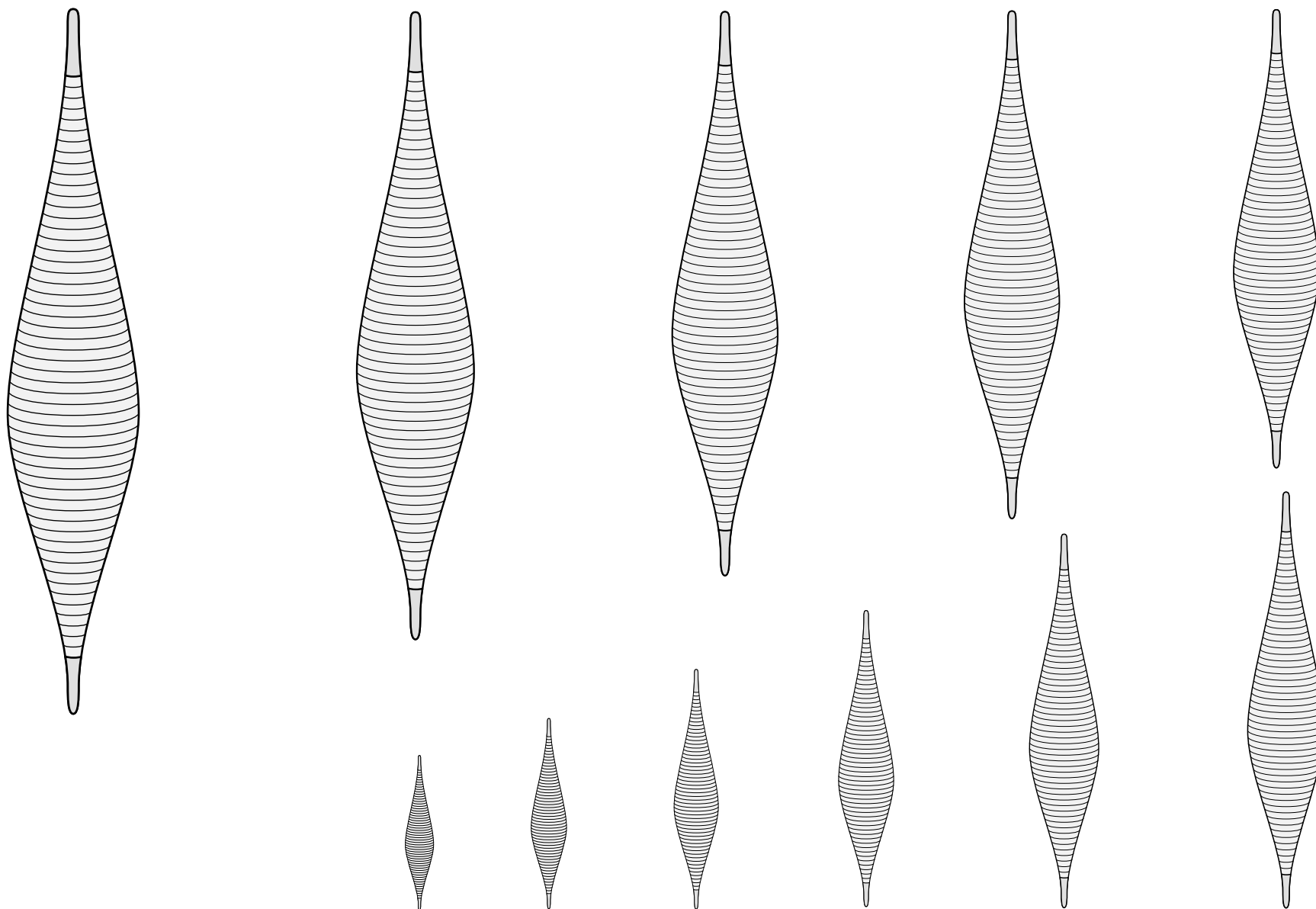

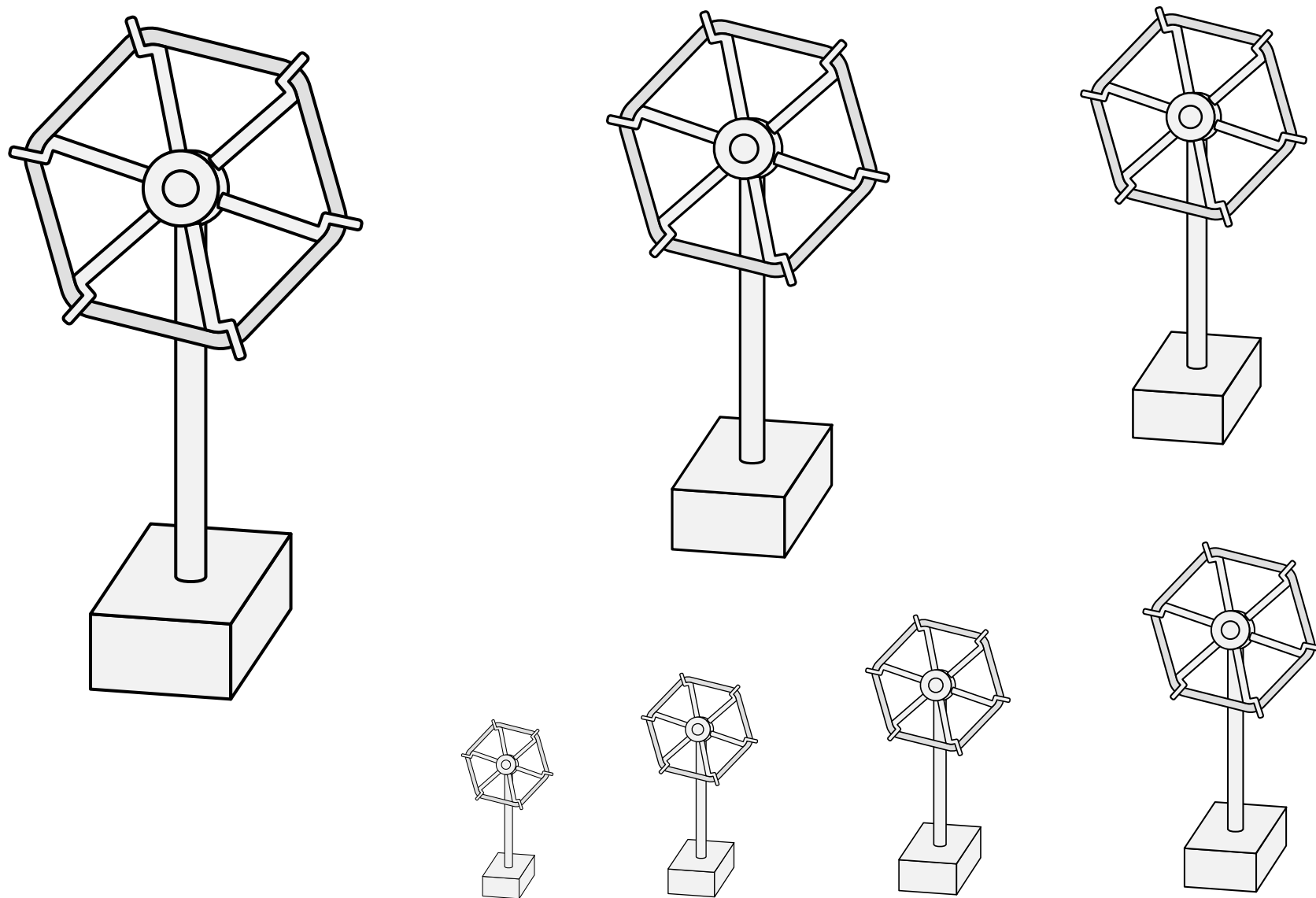
